San Francisco, CA Sep. 3 San Francisco Symphony kicks off the 2014-15 season—Michael Tilson Thomas's 20<sup>th</sup> as Music Director—with Songs from the American Songbook with Bonnie Raitt and Gershwin's *Rhapsody in Blue* with Yuja Wang



- Music Director Michael Tilson Thomas (MTT) and the San Francisco Symphony celebrate 20
  years together in the 2014-15 season with programming that celebrates the elements that have
  defined the course of their partnership, with a particular emphasis on American composers.
- Special guests at the opening night gala include singer-songwriter Bonnie Raitt, a longtime friend of MTT, and pianist Yuja Wang, who has performed with the Orchestra each year since 2006. Ms. Raitt makes her debut with the Orchestra performing selected works from the American songbook of her father, Broadway singer John Raitt, and Ms. Wang performs Gershwin's *Rhapsody in Blue*. As a precursor to the audiovisual displays that MTT will incorporate into this season's concerts, a performance of Stravinsky's *Circus Polka*, a ballet scored for 50 elephants, will feature a special video installation by Emily Eckstein. The program also includes excerpts from Prokofiev's *Romeo and Juliet*—a work which MTT and the Orchestra recorded in the first three months of his tenure as Music Director, and which won the Orchestra its first Grammy under MTT's baton in 1996—as well as Tchaikovsky's *Romeo and Juliet* Fantasy-Overture, drawn from the same Shakespearean subject.
- The 2014-15 season includes performances of 20 American works, a 70<sup>th</sup> birthday celebration for MTT, and a three-week Beethoven festival. This season also sees the launch of SoundBox, a new

- performance space at Davies Symphony Hall that will house innovative programming curated by MTT and Edwin Outwater, among others.
- The gala performance takes place at Davies Symphony Hall on <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>September 3 at 8 p.m.</u> and will be streamed live online at <u>kdfc.com</u>.

Minneapolis, MN Sep. 5 Minnesota Orchestra and Music Director Osmo Vänskä open their 2014-15 classical concert season with guest artist Renée Fleming



- In their first season in the newly renovated Orchestra Hall, the Minnesota Orchestra will perform some of Renée Fleming's favorite opera arias and vocal selections, as well as orchestral selections including Wagner's Prelude to *Die Meistersinger von Nürnberg* and Respighi's *The Pines of Rome*.
- The Orchestra's 2014-15 season includes multi-week program themes, spotlighting Shakespeare, Strauss, and Sibelius.
  - o A centerpiece of the season is the Shakespeare Winterfest, which features orchestral repertoire inspired by the works of William Shakespeare. Conceived by Music Director Osmo Vänskä, the month-long festival includes Mendelssohn's Overture to *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, as well as Tchaikovsky's and Prokofiev's interpretations of *Romeo and Juliet*. Festivalgoers will also hear less frequently performed works, including Walton's Suite from *Henry V* and Sibelius's *The Tempest*.
  - o In celebration of the composer's 150<sup>th</sup> birthday, the Orchestra performs works by Richard Strauss, including "Salome's Dance" from *Salome*, *Burleske* for piano and orchestra with Andrew Staupe, and *An Alpine Symphony*.
  - o Mr. Vänskä conducts the Orchestra in two weeks of performances of Sibelius's Symphonies Nos. 3, 6, and 7. A leading interpreter of the Finnish composer, fellow countryman Vänskä led the Minnesota Orchestra in their first Grammy-winning recording, which featured Symphonies Nos. 1 and 4.
- The performance takes place at Orchestra Hall on Friday, September 5 at 6 p.m.

Salt Lake City, UT Sep. 12 & 13 Music Director Thierry Fischer and the Utah Symphony open their sixth season together with Mahler's Symphony No. 1, "Titan," commencing a two-season-long Mahler symphony cycle

## UTAH SYMPHONY CLASSICALLY CHARGED THIERRY FISCHER, MUSIC DIRECTOR

- Thierry Fischer, who recently extended his contract as Music Director through the 2018-19 season, leads the Utah Symphony in the first concert of his two-year performance cycle, through May 2016, of Mahler's complete symphonic works. In the 2014-15 season, the Utah Symphony performs Mahler's Symphonies Nos. 1 through 4 in four concerts, all led by Mr. Fischer.
- Mr. Fischer's Mahler cycle honors former Utah Symphony Music Director Maurice Abravanel, under whose baton the Utah Symphony became the first American symphony to record all of Mahler's symphonic works, including the Adagio of the unfinished Tenth Symphony, on the Vanguard label.
- Utah Symphony's current Mahler cycle is part of Mr. Fischer's revitalization plan for the organization, which includes new recordings, touring, and a focus on 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary projects during the 2015-16 season.
- Other symphonic cycles Mr. Fischer has introduced to the orchestra since his appointment as Music Director in 1998 are Beethoven's nine symphonies in the 2011-12 season, Mendelssohn's five symphonies in the 2012-13 season, and Carl Nielsen's six symphonies in the 2013-14 season. He has also programmed a multi-season Haydn symphony cycle and a multi-season exploration of works by Stravinsky.
- Along with Mahler's First Symphony, "Titan," the Utah Symphony's 2014-15 season opening concert includes its first performance of *Wellington's Victory* by Beethoven and a rare performance of *Iron Foundry* by Mosolov.
- <u>Performances</u> take place at Abravanel Hall on <u>Friday</u>, <u>September 12</u> and <u>Saturday</u>, <u>September 13</u> at <u>8 p.m.</u>

San Antonio, TX Sep. 23, 26, 27 & 28 A new production of *Fantastic Mr. Fox* by American composer Tobias Picker, who celebrates his 60<sup>th</sup> birthday season and first full season as Artistic Director of Opera San Antonio, opens Opera San Antonio's inaugural season at the new Tobin Center for the Performing Arts







- Opera San Antonio opens its inaugural season as the resident opera company of the new Tobin Center for the Performing Arts with a new production of Tobias Picker's *Fantastic Mr. Fox*. The opera, with a libretto by Donald Sturrock, Artistic Director of the Roald Dahl Foundation, is based on the children's book by Roald Dahl. It was originally commissioned and premiered by LA Opera in 1998 and will be the first of three new productions in Opera San Antonio's 2014-15 season.
- The cast features baritone John Brancy, winner of the Sullivan Foundation Grand Prize and first prize in the Marilyn Horne Vocal Competition, in the title role, joined by Renée Rapier as Mrs. Fox, soprano Elizabeth Futral as Miss Hedgehog, and members of the Children's Chorus of San Antonio as the Fox cubs and the chorus of trees.
- Erica Olden directs and Uruguayan conductor Andres Cladera, the new Resident Conductor of Opera San Antonio, leads members of the San Antonio Symphony. Ms. Olden and Mr. Cladera are cofounders and directors of Pittsburgh's Microscopic Opera Company, and presented the Pittsburgh premiere of *Fantastic Mr. Fox* in 2011. The costumes and sets for the new production are designed by British illustrator Emily Carew Woodard (illustrations featured above) while lighting is designed by Chad R. Jung.
- In September 2013, San Francisco Opera presented the world premiere of Mr. Picker's fifth opera *Dolores Claiborne*. From July 2014 to June 2015, all four of his other operas receive new productions. In addition to *Fantastic Mr. Fox*, these productions include his 2005 opera *An American Tragedy* in a newly revised version at the 2014 Glimmerglass Festival, his 2001 opera *Thérèse Raquin* at the Long Beach Opera and Chicago Opera Theater in early 2015, and his 1996 opera *Emmeline* at Opera Theatre of St. Louis in June 2015.
- The new production opens on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>September 23 at 7:30 p.m.</u> at the Tobin Center's Carlos Alvarez Studio Theater. Subsequent performances take place on <u>Friday</u>, <u>September 26 at 7:30 p.m.</u>; <u>Saturday</u>, <u>September 27 at 7:30 p.m.</u>; and <u>Sunday</u>, <u>September 28 at 2:00 p.m.</u> The September 27 performance will be simulcast onto an outdoor screen in Tobin Center's River Plaza.

Other works on the program include *Metamorphosen* and *Death and Transfiguration*, with additional works to be announced on a later date.

Ms. Netrebko is joined by celebrated Verdi interpreters including baritone Željko Lucic as Macbeth, tenor Joseph Calleja as Macduff, and bass René Pape as Banquo. - Mr. Noble, former artistic director and chief executive of the Royal Shakespeare Company, who directed two productions of the play for the company as well as dozens of other Shakespeare classics, said, "It's the greatest story Verdi ever told ... It's not hard to see what attracted the composer to the story: A civil war that brought to prominence a popular hero general who becomes the national leader and, over time, becomes oppressive and brutalizes his people."
- Mr. Noble's production team includes set and costumes by Tony-nominated and Olivier Award-winning designer Mark Thompson, with lighting by designer Jean Kalman, both of whom have worked on Royal Shakespeare Company productions.
- *The Met: Live in HD*'s 2014-15 season includes ten live transmissions, five of which are of new opera productions, seen in more than 2,000 movie theaters in 65 countries worldwide.

- English film, theatre, television, and opera director, Richard Eyre, who also directed this season's revival of *Carmen* at the Met, sets *Le Nozze di Figaro* in the late 1920s in a 19<sup>th</sup>-century manor house in Seville, with sets and costumes designed by Tony Award-winner Rob Howell, who utilizes a revolving stage to keep the action moving through the scenes.

New York, NY Oct. 21 Pianist Shai Wosner performs in an all-Brahms program of the composer's late solo and chamber works for the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center and CMS on Tour



- In a recital presented by the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, Shai Wosner performs in a program of Brahms's solo and chamber works, all composed during the last ten years of the composer's life. The program opens with Brahms's Trio in A Minor for Clarinet, Cello, and Piano, Op. 114 and Sonata in D Minor for Violin and Piano, Op. 108, for which Mr. Wosner is joined by David Shifrin on clarinet, Timothy Eddy on cello, and Erin Keefe on violin. Mr. Wosner then performs two solo works by Brahms, the Intermezzo in E-flat Major for Piano, Op. 117, No. 1 and Rhapsody in E-flat Major for Piano, Op. 119, No. 4.
- The program for this New York recital will also be performed as part of CMS on Tour, which includes performances in Denver, CO on <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>October 15</u>; Iowa City, IA on <u>Thursday</u>, <u>October 16</u>; and Sonoma, CA on <u>Saturday</u>, <u>October 18</u>.
- In 2010, Mr. Wosner's debut recording, which juxtaposed solo works by Brahms and Schoenberg, was released on the Onyx label. It included Brahms's Fantasien, Op. 116 and Variations and Fugue on a Theme of Handel, Op. 24.
- Widely sought after for his versatility and spirit of partnership in chamber music, Mr. Wosner was a member of Lincoln Center's Chamber Music Society Two from 2002 to 2004 and has collaborated with artists that include Martin Fröst, Lynn Harrell, Dietrich Henschel, Cho-Liang Lin, Christian Tetzlaff, and Pinchas Zukerman.
- The performance takes place at Alice Tully Hall on <u>Tuesday</u>, October 21 at 7:30 p.m.



- In the first of their four Carnegie concerts in the 2014-15 season, Orpheus Chamber Orchestra welcomes back pianist Jonathan Biss, returning to perform Beethoven's Piano Concerto No. 3 in C Minor.
- In addition to the Beethoven Piano Concerto, the program includes the overture to *Cambiale di matrimonio* by Rossini, *Sinfonietta* by Poulenc, and *Prologue and Variations* by Ellen Taafe Zwilich, the first female composer to win the Pulitzer Prize for Music, who celebrates her 75<sup>th</sup> birthday this season.
- In February 2014, Orpheus released their first self-produced album with live performances of Beethoven's Fifth and Seventh Symphonies.
- In an onstage interview at an Orpheus concert at Carnegie Hall in 2012, one of the players said that during the first decades of the orchestra's history, there was disagreement about whether its chamber-music approach would be conducive to performing works by Beethoven. After Orpheus last performed an all-Beethoven program at a sold-out Carnegie concert in January 2014, *The New York Times* responded, "It doesn't only work, it's delightful ... Orpheus had snap in the *Coriolan Overture*."
- Mr. Biss is in the process of recording all 32 of Beethoven's piano sonatas and teaches the fiveweek online video course *Exploring Beethoven's Piano Sonatas*, a collaboration between the Curtis Institute of Music and Coursera. - In an article for *Opera News*, Mr. Conlon wrote, "*Lady Macbeth of the Mtsensk District* is the most important Russian opera of the twentieth century ... [Shostakovich] realistically depicted the lowly status of Russian women and laid bare the hypocrisy and brutality of Soviet society; in one great gesture he created a musical vocabulary all his own, using the orchestra with novel mastery and virtuosity. No modern opera has had greater political repercussions ... Given the climate he lived in, Shostakovich's sardonic portrayal of the Stalinist police network in Lady Macbeth was an act of outrageous bravery."
- Mr. Conlon made his Metropolitan Opera debut in 1976 and has since led more than 260
  performances at the Met Opera House. He has been music director of the LA Opera since 2006,

Mr. Hough performs Dvořák's Piano Concerto in G Minor, Op. 33, with the Orchestra of St. Luke's and conductor Harry Bicket. The program also includes Wagner's Siegfried Idyll and Haydn's Symphony No. 104 in D Major, "London."
- Often overshadowed by the Cello and Violin Concertos, Dvořák's Piano Concerto is notoriously difficult—Mr. Hough claims even more so than the piano works of Liszt.
- Mr. Hough is the first classical musician to receive a MacArthur Grant, was named Commander of the British Empire in December 2013, and was cited by *The Economist* as one of 20 living polymaths. The depth of his artistry and creativity go beyond his playing and he has a number of talents, interests and projects, including writing, composing, painting, food, hats, perfumes and theology. He is featured in a <u>Liszt Sonata iPad app</u>, his <u>blog for The Telegraph</u> has nearly 15,000 followers, and his discography of more than 50 recordings includes his recently released CD <u>In the Night</u> featuring his own second piano sonata, *notturno luminoso*.

- San Francisco Symphony Music Director Michael Tilson Thomas (MTT), whose first musical love was piano, is joined by five keyboard colleagues: Emanuel Ax, Jeremy Denk, Marc-André Hamelin, Jean-Yves Thibaudet, and Yuja Wang, in a concert celebrating his 70<sup>th</sup> birthday (December 21, 1944).
- The concert program features *Hexaméron* for six pianos and orchestra, a theme and variations first composed for solo piano by Liszt and five of his contemporaries: Sigismond Thalberg, Johann Peter Pixis, Henri Herz, Carl Czerny, and Frédéric Chopin. Each composer contributed a variation, with Liszt composing the introduction (itself a paraphrase of "The March of the Puritans" from Bellini's opera *I Puritani*) and connecting interludes. Commissioned by the eccentric Princess Belgiojoso for a benefit concert, the original concept involved each composer performing his own variation in front of an orchestra. Due to his colleagues' tardiness in delivering their manuscripts, however, Liszt never completed the orchestral version, and what remains is a solo piano score with orchestral cues. Composer Robert Linn reconstructed the orchestral version from Liszt's manuscript, premiering the work with three pianos and orchestra in 1963.

Recording Release February Kirill Gerstein performs Tchaikovsky's second version of the Piano Concerto No. 1 in the world-premiere recording of a new authoritative score



- Pianist Kirill Gerstein performs in the world-premiere recording of a new scholarly urtext
  edition of Tchaikovsky's second version of the Piano Concerto No. 1. James Gaffigan conducts
  the Deutsches Symphonie-Orchester Berlin in this landmark recording.
- Mr. Gerstein was given pre-publication access to the new score, which is currently being prepared for publication by the Tchaikovsky Museum and Archive in Klin, Russia. The score forms the first installment of a new urtext edition of the complete works of Tchaikovsky, to be released by the Museum in 2015 in celebration of the 175th anniversary of the composer's birth.
- Audiences are accustomed to hearing this work from a posthumously published, unauthorized
  edition. The new recording affords listeners the opportunity to hear the work as the composer
  intended.
- Following the premiere of the work in 1875, the composer set about revising certain portions of the score. A second version was published in 1879, and it is this score that Tchaikovsky conducted in his own concert appearances, including his last public appearance nine days before his death in 1893. In comparison with today's more commonly heard unauthorized edition, the composer's own version contains a variety of different dynamic, articulation, and tempo markings throughout, arpeggiated chords in the opening, and a longer trio section in the third movement. According to Mr. Gerstein, the changes in the unauthorized edition "add a flavor of superficial brilliance to the piece while taking away from its Schumannesque musical character." Mr. Gerstein has written about the history of the work—and problems of its authorship—for *The New York Review of Books*.
- The recording also includes Prokofiev's Piano Concerto No. 2, which for very different reasons also exists in a revised edition. After the 1913 original manuscript was burned by the composer's neighbors on one of the colder days after the Russian Revolution, Prokofiev reconstructed and revised the work, premiering it in Paris in 1924.

- Bach & Beyond Part 2, in which Jennifer Koh pairs Bach's first Sonata and Partita with Bartók's Sonata for solo violin and the world premiere recording of Kaija Saariaho's *Frises* for solo violin and electronics, will be released by Cedille, marking Ms. Koh's tenth recording on the Chicagobased label.
- Ms. Koh debuted *Bach & Beyond*—a three-part series of recital programs that explore the history of solo violin repertoire from Bach's Six Sonatas and Partitas to modern-day composers and new commissions—in 2009 in commemoration of the 325<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Bach's birth.
- Ms. Koh performed the US premiere of *Frises* at Miller Theatre in February 2014. In that recital, *Frises* was juxtaposed with Bach's Partita No. 2, which directly inspired Ms. Saariaho's work.
- Ms. Koh brought *Bach & Beyond*, which started as a recital concept, to CD in October 2012 with the first installment of her three-part series of studio recordings.
- The *Bach & Beyond Part 1* recording, which was named one of the best recordings of 2012 by *The New York Times*, includes Bach's second and third Partitas, Ysaÿe's Sonata No. 2, Saariaho's Nocturne for Violin, and the premiere recording of Missy Mazzoli's *Dissolve O My Heart*. Ms. Koh's other albums include *Two x Four* (2014), with four double-violin concertos by Bach, Philip Glass, Anna Clyne, and David Ludwig, performed with violinist Jaime Laredo; and *Signs*, *Games + Messages* (2013), featuring works by Kurtág, Janáček, and Bartók, performed with pianist Shai Wosner.
- This season, Ms. Koh performs her *Bach & Beyond Part 3* recital program, which includes a new work by John Harbison that receives its world premiere in January 2015 at 92<sup>nd</sup> Street Y in New York. She also continues her *Bach & Beyond* series with *Part 3* at Strathmore Hall in North Bethesda, Zellerbach Hall for UC Berkeley's Cal Performances, Oberlin College, and for the University Musical Society in Ann Arbor.
- The album, to be released on the Cedille label, is available on CD in <u>February 2015</u>.



- Continuing his Mahler symphony cycle with the Utah Symphony, Music Director Thierry
  Fischer conducts Mahler's Third Symphony, featuring mezzo-soprano and Utah native Tamara
  Mumford, women of the Utah Symphony Chorus, and choristers of the Madeleine Choir
  School.
- Mr. Fischer, who recently extended his contract as Music Director through the 2018-19 season, is leading the Utah Symphony in a performance cycle of Mahler's complete symphonic works over two seasons, through May 2016. In the 2014-15 season, the Utah Symphony performs Mahler's Symphonies Nos. 1 through 4 in four concerts, all led by Mr. Fischer.
- Mr. Fischer's Mahler cycle honors former Utah Symphony Music Director Maurice Abravanel, under whose baton the Utah Symphony became the first American symphony to record all of Mahler's symphonic works, including the Adagio of the unfinished Tenth Symphony, on the Vanguard label.
- Utah Symphony's current Mahler cycle is part of Mr. Fischer's revitalization plan for the organization, which includes new recordings, touring, and a focus on 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary projects during the 2015-16 season.
- Other symphonic cycles Mr. Fischer has introduced to the orchestra since his appointment as
  Music Director in 1998 are Beethoven's nine symphonies in the 2011-12 season, Mendelssohn's
  five symphonies in the 2012-13 season, and Carl Nielsen's six symphonies in the 2013-14 season.
  He has also programmed a multi-season Haydn symphony cycle and a multi-season
  exploration of works by Stravinsky.
- <u>Performances</u> take place at Abravanel Hall on <u>Friday, February 6</u> and <u>Saturday, February 7</u> at <u>8</u> <u>p.m.</u>

Los Angeles, CA Feb. 7, 15, 18, 21, 26 & Mar. 1 Music Director James Conlon leads LA Opera's new production and West Coast premiere of John Corigliano's *The Ghosts of Versailles*, the first in a series of three operas based on Beaumarchais' plays on the adventures of Figaro, as part of LA Opera's *Figaro Unbound: Culture, Power, and Revolution at Play*, a celebration of the playwright's legacy



- Music Director James Conlon and LA Opera launch Figaro Unbound: Culture, Power, and Revolution at Play, a three-month celebration of the French playwright Pierre-Augustin Caron de Beaumarchais that centers on three operas based on the adventures of Figaro as originally told in Beaumarchais's series of three stage comedies.
- Versailles, based on Beaumarchais's La Mère coupable (The Guilty Mother), features soprano Patricia Racette as Marie Antoinette and two-time Tony Award-winner Patti LuPone in the mezzo-soprano role of Turkish singer Samira. Darko Tresnjak, who won the 2014 Tony Award for directing A Gentleman's Guide to Love and Murder, returns to LA Opera to stage this production. The original production of Corigliano's opera, with a libretto by William M. Hoffman, premiered at the Metropolitan Opera in 1991. The Ghosts of Versailles is the first of three LA Opera productions led by Mr. Conlon for Figaro Unbound.
- The other two operas in LA Opera's Figaro trilogy are Rossini's *Il barbiere di Siviglia*, based on the Beaumarchais play *Le Barbier de Séville ou la Précaution inutile* (*The Barber of Seville or the Useless Precaution*), and Mozart's *Le nozze di Figaro*, based on the Beaumarchais play *La folle journée*, ou le Mariage de Figaro (*The Mad Day*, or the Marriage of Figaro).
- LA Opera's programming of the Figaro trilogy aims to immerse audiences in the world of the free-thinking barber named Figaro, the fictional character who created a sensation in the years leading up to the French Revolution, and to investigate the lasting influence of Beaumarchais's Figaro plays, which capture the changing social attitudes of late-18th-century France.
- The new production opens <u>Saturday</u>, <u>February 7 at 7:30 p.m.</u> at the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion. Subsequent performances take place on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>February 15 at 2:00 p.m.</u>; <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>February 18 at 7:30 p.m.</u>; <u>Saturday</u>, <u>February 21 at 7:30 p.m.</u>; <u>Thursday</u>, <u>February 26 at 7:30 p.m.</u>; and <u>Sunday</u>, <u>March 1 at 2:00 p.m.</u>

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New York, NY Feb. 7 Orpheus Chamber Orchestra performs the New York premiere of an Orpheus-commissioned work by Timothy Andres and Mendelssohn's Violin Concerto featuring Augustin Dumay, in his Orpheus debut this season, at Carnegie Hall



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- Continuing its four-concert season at Carnegie Hall, Orpheus Chamber Orchestra performs a new work commissioned from Brooklyn-based composer and pianist Timothy Andres, who was a finalist for Orpheus's *Project 440*, an initiative to identify rising talent among a new generation of composers, four years ago.
- French violinist Augustin Dumay makes his debut with Orpheus performing Mendelssohn's Violin Concerto in E Minor, Op. 6. Mr. Dumay gained international recognition in 1979 when he performed in Paris at the request of Herbert von Karajan. He has since made close to 40 recordings and performs with major orchestras around the world.
- Other compositions by Mr. Andres include a piano quintet for Jonathan Biss and the Elias String Quartet, a solo work titled *Old Friend* for pianist Kirill Gerstein, a string quartet premiered by the Attaca Quartet, and a work titled *Safe Travels* for the yMusic sextet. His debut album *Shy and Mighty* was released by Nonesuch Records in May 2010.
- The program also includes Schubert's Symphony No. 5 in B-flat Major and Orpheus's first performance of the orchestral suite from *Les Boréades* by Jean-Phillipe Rameau.
- Performing without a conductor, Orpheus rotates musical leadership roles for each piece and
  makes artistic and administrative decisions through democratic collaboration and open forum

Mr. Fischer has championed Ms. Skride since their first concert together in 2006, performing Shostakovich's First Violin Concerto with the Malmö Symphony Orchestra. - Following his performance of Dvořák's Piano Concerto with the Orchestra of St. Luke's and Harry Bicket, British pianist Stephen Hough returns to Carnegie Hall to perform Debussy's *La plus que lente, Estampes, Children's Corner*, and *L'isle joyeuse*, interspersed by Chopin's four Ballades.
- Mr. Hough says of the program, "No two composers were more totally at home in front of the piano than Debussy and Chopin ... They both changed the way we hear the sound of the piano, both of them inventors of sonority."

- Mr. Hough is the first classical musician to receive a MacArthur Grant, was named Commander of the British Empire in December 2013, and was cited by *The Economist* as one of 20 living polymaths. 

- For the first time in its 36-year history, Utah Opera presents *The Rake's Progress*, based on William Hogarth's series of eight lithographs, with music by Stravinsky and a libretto by W. H. Auden and Chester Kallman. The opera, the fourth and final production in Utah Opera's 2014-15 season, will be presented using David Hockney's 1975 staging.
- As part of his multi-season exploration of works by Stravinsky, Swiss conductor and Utah Symphony Music Director Thierry Fischer makes his Utah Opera debut with this production. In 2012, Mr. Fischer's recording of Swiss compatriot Frank Martin's opera *Der Sturm* won in the opera category of the International Classical Music Award. The opera was recorded with the Netherlands Radio Philharmonic Orchestra and Chorus and released on the Hyperion label.
- Mr. Fischer conducts a cast that features tenor Norman Reinhardt as Tom Rakewell, soprano Joélle Harvey as Anne Trulove, and bass-baritone Mark Schnaible as Nick Shadow.

- James Conlon conducts five concerts with the May Festival Chorus and Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra in his 36<sup>th</sup> season as Music Director of the Cincinnati May Festival, the oldest continuous choral festival in the Western Hemisphere. The 2015 season runs from May 22 to 30.
- Mr. Conlon has provided artistic leadership of the May Festival for more seasons than any other music director in the festival's 142-year old history, and holds a place among the longest-tenured music directors of any major classical music institution in the United States.
- Founded in 1873, the Cincinnati May Festival presents major choral works each May, featuring the all-volunteer May Festival Chorus and Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra in five concerts spanning two consecutive weekends.
- Last year, when Mr. Conlon took the Cincinnati May Festival performers to the fourth and final installment of the *Spring for Music* festival held at Carnegie Hall, *The New Yorker's* Alex Ross said, "[James] Conlon and his Cincinnati forces ... conveyed the moment with precision and fervor" during the "visionary" closing section of an oratorio in R. Nathaniel Dett's *The Ordering of Moses*,

- which Mr. Ross described as a "startling, potent piece" and "a major discovery of *Spring for Music.*"

- Utah Symphony closes its 2014-15 season with Music Director Thierry Fischer conducting Mahler's Symphony No. 4, featuring soprano Celena Shafer, and Shostakovich's Violin Concerto No. 1 featuring German violinist Veronika Eberle, making her Utah Symphony debut.
- Ms. Eberle was introduced by Sir Simon Rattle to a packed Salzburg
  Festpielhaus at the 2006 Salzburg Easter Festival in a performance of
  the Beethoven concerto with the Berliner Philharmoniker. She has
  also performed with the Hessischer Rundfunk Sinfonieorchester, LA
  Philharmonic, NDR Hamburg, NHK Symphony, New York
  Philharmonic, Rundfunk Sinfonieorchester Berlin, and Rundfunk
  Sinfonieorchester Stuttgart.
- Ms. Shafer, a native of Utah and 2014-15 Utah Symphony artist-inresidence, appears in three Utah Symphony concerts this season, including the performances of Mahler's "Resurrection" Symphony in November 2014.
- Mr. Fischer, who recently extended his contract as Music Director through the 2018-19 season, is leading the Utah Symphony in a performance cycle of Mahler's complete symphonic works over two seasons, through May 2016. In the 2014-15 season, the Utah Symphony performs Mahler's Symphonies Nos. 1 through 4 in four concerts, all led by Mr. Fischer.
- Mr. Fischer's Mahler cycle honors former Utah Symphony Music Director Maurice Abravanel, under whose baton the Utah Symphony became the first American symphony to record all of Mahler's symphonic works, including the Adagio of the unfinished Tenth Symphony, on the Vanguard label.

- Frequent collaborators Jennifer Koh and Anna Clyne bring the premiere of Ms. Clyne's Violin Concerto to Ms. Koh's hometown of Chicago in a concert performed with Seattle Symphony Music Director Ludovic Morlot and the Chicago Symphony Orchestra (CSO). While Ms. Clyne, serving as CSO composer-in-residence from 2010 to 2014, has written numerous orchestral, chamber, and solo works, her Violin Concerto is the first concerto she has written for solo instrument and full orchestra and only the third concerto in her oeuvre. Her earlier concertos were also composed specifically to be premiered by Ms. Koh—the double violin concerto *Prince of Clouds* in 2012 and a new version of *Rest These Hands*, rearranged as a violin chamber-concerto, which was commissioned by and performed with the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra at Carnegie Hall in December 2014.
- John von Rhein from the *Chicago Tribune* wrote that Ms. Koh's recent recording *Two x Four*, which includes *Prince of Clouds*, "honors Clyne's friendship with the brilliant, Chicago-born violin virtuoso Jennifer Koh, a musical soul mate who also believes in artistic collaboration." He continued, "For Clyne, Koh would appear to be a potent muse."
- Ms. Koh and Ms. Clyne met in 2009, after Esa-Pekka Salonen suggested that Ms. Koh listen to the composer's music. Ms. Koh reached out to her and a friendship and collaboration was formed.

- In a nod to Music Director Michael Tilson Thomas (MTT) and the San Francisco Symphony's first summer Beethoven Festival together 25 years ago, the 2014-15 season concludes with a three-week exploration of Beethoven's landmark works.
- The first weekend centers on a semi-staged performance of the Missa solemnis, directed by Michael Levine and featuring video art by Finn Ross. Featured soloists include soprano Joélle Harvery, mezzo-sopranos Sasha Cooke and Tamara Mumford, tenor Brandon Jovanovich, and bass-baritone Shenyang.
  - Performances take place at Davies Symphony Hall on Wednesday, June 10, Thursday, June 11, Friday, June 12, and Saturday, June 13 at 8 p.m.
  - The production is co-commissioned by the LA Philharmonic, where MTT will conduct the work January 9-11.
- The second week's performances feature Finnish soprano Karita Mattila in the concert aria *Ah!* perfido and Jonathan Biss in the Piano Concerto No. 4. The program also includes the Overture to *The Creatures of Prometheus* and Symphony No. 6.
  - Performances take place at Davies Symphony Hall on Wednesday, June 17 and Friday, June 19 at 8 p.m.
- Mr. Biss is featured in another program on <u>Thursday</u>, <u>June 18 at 8 p.m.</u>, playing the Piano Fantasy in G Minor. The program also includes Symphony No. 5, the Sanctus from Mass in C Major, and the Choral Fantasy.
- On <u>Saturday</u>, <u>June 20 at 7 p.m.</u>, MTT recreates Beethoven's legendary 1808 marathon concert, in which his Symphonies Nos. 5 and 6, Piano Concerto No. 4, Choral Fantasy, and Mass in C Major all received their premieres. - Pipa virtuoso Wu Man performs Lou Harrison's Concerto for Pipa and Orchestra, among other works, at the 2015 Ojai Music Festival.
- The 2015 festival, directed by percussionist Steven Schick, focuses on music by 20<sup>th</sup>- and 21<sup>st</sup>-century composers, and also includes performances by I.C.E. (International Contemporary Ensemble), cellist Maya Beiser, and the San Diego-based chamber ensemble Renga.
- Mr. Harrison composed his pipa concerto for Wu Man in 1997. Her performance of the work with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra is featured on the 2008 Grammy-nominated album *Traditions and Transformations: Sounds of Silk Road Chicago*.
- As a soloist, educator, and composer, Wu Man has given her lute-like instrument—which has a history of over 2,000 years in China—a new role in both traditional and contemporary music. She has premiered hundreds of new works for the pipa while spearheading multimedia projects to both preserve and create awareness of China's ancient musical traditions. She collaborates with musicians from wide-ranging artistic disciplines, allowing her to reach diverse audiences as she works to break through cultural and musical borders.

- American composer Tobias Picker's opera *Emmeline*, which mirrors the Greek tragedy of *Oedipus* and is inspired by a true story from the mill towns of 19<sup>th</sup>-century rural New England, receives its St. Louis premiere in a new production at the Opera Theatre of St. Louis as part of its 40<sup>th</sup> season. The librettist for *Emmeline*, which premiered in 1996 at Santa Fe Opera, is J.D. McClatchy, who also wrote the libretto for Mr. Picker's 2013 opera *Dolores Claiborne*.
- Soprano Joyce El-Khoury makes her Opera Theatre of St. Louis debut in the title role. Tenor John Irvin sings as Matthew, Emmeline's illegitimate son; contralto Meredith Arwady returns as Emmeline's Aunt Hannah; and baritone Wayne Tigges makes his debut as Mr. Maguire, a factory supervisor who fathers Matthew.
- George Manahan returns to Opera Theatre of St. Louis to conduct this new production, which is staged by Artistic Director James Robinson.
- *Emmeline* is based on Judith Rossner's 1980 novel, a fictionalized account of a 19th-century Maine woman who, at 13, has her illegitimate infant son taken away from her to be raised by others. Emmeline and her son Matthew meet twenty years later and share an immediate attraction that leads to their marriage. Emmeline's aunt, however, recognizes Matthew despite the years and word spreads across town. Soon after, Matthew deserts Emmeline, who is ostracized and dies isolated as an old woman.
- In September 2013, San Francisco Opera presented the world premiere of Mr. Picker's fifth opera *Dolores Claiborne*. Mr. Picker celebrates his 60<sup>th</sup> birthday season this year, and from July 2014 to June 2015, his first four operas all receive new productions. In additions to *Emmeline*, these productions include his 2005 opera *An American Tragedy* in a newly revised version at the 2014 Glimmerglass Festival, his 1998 opera *Fantastic Mr. Fox* at Opera San Antonio to open his first full season as Artistic Director in September 2014, and his 2001 opera *Thérèse Raquin* at the Long Beach Opera and Chicago Opera Theater in early 2015.

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San Francisco, CA Jun. 13, 19, 23, 28 & 30 San Francisco Opera and General Director David Gockley present the world premiere of Marco Tutino and Fabio Ceresa's *La Ciociara* (*Two Women*), directed by Francesca Zambello and conducted by Music Director Nicola Luisotti



- La Ciociara (Two Women) receives its world premiere presentation at San Francisco Opera. The opera, with music by Italian composer Marco Tutino set to a libretto by the composer and Fabio Ceresa, is based on 20th-century Italian author Alberto Moravia's 1958 novel of the same name. The story follows a strong-willed widow and her teenage daughter in World War II as they flee Rome in an attempt to find safe refuge. In 1960, the novel was adapted into a film by Carlo Ponti starring Sophia Loren, for which she won an Academy Award for Best Actress.
- David Gockley, now in his ninth year as San Francisco Opera General Director, has been a
  driving force in commissioning and presenting contemporary operas over the course of his
  career, which includes a 33-year tenure as General Director of Houston Grand Opera. In a
  period of seven months from March to October 2013, three operas received their world
  premiere at San Francisco Opera under Mr. Gockley's directorship—Nolan Gasser and Carey
  Harrison's *The Secret Garden*, Mark Adamo's *The Gospel of Mary Magdalene*, and Tobias Picker
  and J.D. McClatchy's *Dolores Claiborne*. *La Ciociara* marks Gockley's 40th world premiere
  presentation.
- Italian soprano Anna Caterina Antonacci, who made her San Francisco Opera debut in 1992 in the title role of Rossini's *Ermione*, stars as Cesira, the mother of Rosetta. Rosetta is played by soprano Sarah Shafer, who performed the lead role of Mary in *The Secret Garden* at San Francisco Opera. Completing the cast are tenor Stephen Costello, returning as Michele, a young intellectual who becomes close to both mother and daughter, and bass-baritone Mark Delavan, returning as Giovanni.
- *La Ciociara* will be led by Music Director Nicola Luisotti and staged by opera and theater director Francesca Zambello, who directed San Francisco Opera's *Ring* cycle in 2011. Sets are designed by Peter Davison, costumes by Jess Goldstein, lighting by Mark McCullough, and projections by S. Katy Tucker.
- Sung in Italian, *La Ciociara* is Mr. Tutino's fifteenth opera and showcases his signature dramatic and lyrical compositional style, with which he reimagines traditional Italian verismo opera for the 21<sup>st</sup> century.
- Commissioned by the San Francisco Opera, *La Ciociara* is a co-production with Teatro Regio di Torino.
- The world premiere performance takes place on <u>Saturday</u>, <u>June 13 at 7:30 p.m.</u> at the War Memorial Opera House. Subsequent performances take place on <u>Friday</u>, <u>June 19</u>, <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>June 23</u>, and <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>June 30</u> at <u>7:30 p.m.</u>, and on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>June 28 at 2:00 p.m.</u>
